What the Parish Council have been up to

As the end of the financial year approaches, the Parish Council are pleased to announce that the following projects are due to be completed before the end of March 2010:

Bus Shelters

Following a comprehensive audit of all of the bus shelters in the village (we have nine), an order has been placed to make essential repairs and deep clean each one. Panels and windows will be replaced where necessary.

Borley Way Play Area

As part of our long term plans, the wooden fence at Borley Way will be replaced. This is the last one of our play areas to be upgraded. The fences previously installed at Lady Jermy Way have already proved their worth. The new fence will extend the toddler play area as we intend to install a new piece of exciting equipment in the new financial year. The springer, which had been vandilised has been removed and it will be replaced at the same time as the new equipment. Please do report any vandilism to the Police. Regular patrols are made in the village.

Teversham Foxgloves

The see-saw has been replaced (see picture) and the goal mouth on the open space has been filled.

Recreation Ground Car Park

Following all of the hard work to clear the area by White Bros, new signs and gate from Teversham Engineering and the new barrier at the front entrance from Borley



Brothers, parking issues have been reduced. However, if you are attending a football match, remember to park in the car park and NOT illegally on the highway or Clay Pits Road. Thank you to everyone for their continued co-operation. Please remember to inform us of issues such as unlit street lamps, pot holes, fly-tipping etc. The Parish Council welcome feedback and work to make our community a better place for everyone.

Teversham Church of England Primary School

Among the many activities taking place in school over the past few months, an undoubted highlight was the opportunity for 30 children to join the Marshall Group of Companies to greet H.M The Queen and HRH The Duke of Edinburgh in November - we were only sad that we could not all go.



However, many more of us were able to attend the switching on of the Christmas lights by the Mayor shortly afterwards.

We enjoyed welcoming family and friends to 'Born in a Barn' at Christmas, performed by our younger children, our year 6 pupils

were especially pleased to serve tea and cake and chat to the village's senior citizens. Our Key Stage 2 children and families processed to the church with lanterns for an evening carol service there, and welcomed parents back to school afterwards for festive refreshments. Large display boards depicting the saints associated with Christmas were prepared by the children, and left in place over the Christmas season – we couldn't quite manage 'All Saints', as our village church is named, but we managed half a dozen.

Then came the snow...having explained to the children that the white scenes on Christmas cards were something of a myth, what should come along but more snow than we have seen in a long time. It is always very difficult deciding whether or not to close the school, but we managed to stay open on all but one afternoon, and had great fun playing in the snow, as the poem and picture below show.

We are a diverse group of Christians living in Teversham, Cherry Hinton and Fulbourn. All are welcome to gather with us on a Sunday at 11 am. There is a crèche for the very young and a free lunch for everyone afterwards - you are welcome to just come and meet us over food if you prefer! We also meet in the evenings at 6pm at the Chapel or Cherry Hinton Community Junior School.



Since September, five of us have been running a much-enjoyed Bible Fun Club in Teversham School every Monday afternoon. Retired people are welcome in the Chapel lounge for chat, tea, cake and a thought for the day every other Friday at 2.30 pm in 'Classic Cafe'. Classic Cafe has been running for two years now and is enjoyed by all who come.

We try to serve the community in a number of ways including helping out with people's gardens but if there are other ways we could help please get in touch. If you'd like to find out more about the Christian faith we run regular discussion-based groups and are involved with the city-wide 'A Passion for Life' initiative this spring.

Hope Community Church is breathing fresh life into an independent Church tradition that has its roots in a Teversham Cottage where the famous Victorian preacher Charles Haddon Spurgeon preached his first sermon aged 16 in 1851. True Grit

The amount of white stuff recently (snow for those who haven't made the connection) will not have escaped your attention and has probably had an impact on you, some positive and some negative. For the positive impact, may we all continue to enjoy this and make the most of it as I am sure that for some, this will have been the first time you will have seen so much snow. For the negative impact this can be quite serious and leave erstwhile active individuals housebound and unable to go about their daily routines. It is this aspect we have agreed to address.

Teversham Parish Council has agreed to trial the provision of gritting salt and make available to the village, two grit bins, to be located in two areas that will maximise the benefit for those most vulnerable to the negative side of snow. The bins will be stocked with grit and will be available for you to use and spread the grit in areas that you deem most necessary.

This is a self help scheme. Use of the gritting salt is entirely at your discretion. We will ensure that the bins remain adequately stocked. Depending upon the success of the scheme and the demand and salt usage, the trial may be extended to more bins and more salt. Your feedback is greatly appreciated.
