## Report from District Councillor Hunt

### Devolution

At a public meeting, councillors voted to support the deal which could see a new £600 million fund (£20million annual fund) to improve transport and infrastructure as well as a £170 million for housing being handed down from Government and put in the hands of local people rather than Westminster.

It is hoped that this will be an opportunity to boost jobs, transport and affordable homes across the area.

The proposal for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough would see a Combined Authority chaired by a directly elected Mayor. The bid also includes:

- A new £20million annual fund for the next 30 years (£600million) to support economic growth, development of local infrastructure and jobs.
- £170 million for affordable housing.
- Transport infrastructure improvements such as work on the A14 and upgrades to the A10.
- Rail improvements (new rolling stock, improved Cambridge, London rail)
- Integrating local health and social care resources to provide better outcomes for residents.
- Apprenticeship budget – to give more opportunities to our young people
- This proposal will be the first in a series of proposals which devolve more funding and powers from Government to this area.

For a devolution deal Government requires that there is an elected mayor. This means local people will be given the chance to directly elect their choice to become Mayor, to chair and lead the combined authority. The proposals also include checks and balances with representatives of the partner organisations making sure any decisions are made democratically. No powers will be taken away from authorities without their consent.

Some things continue through the summer, with **Classic Café for over 60s** every other Friday afternoon in the chapel– we have games available, tea, cake, chat and a thought for the day (12<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> August, 9<sup>th</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> September etc.). Lunch Together is taking a break but has been a tremendous success since September – we resume with these over 60s lunches on the first Wednesday of the month from September. If you've been meaning to come along or have an older neighbour or family member whom you think could benefit please get in touch.

Although the lunch team are taking a break, in July we had a Fish & Chip lunch to which some of our regular guests came, and on **Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> August from 3-4.30 we'll have 'Cake & a Cuppa'** in the garden of the Manse, 8 High Street, so if you're around, do come and join us and meet other local folks – all ages welcome, and free.

### Cambridge International Airport (Marshalls)

from Councillor F Freeman, who attends the Airport Consultative Committee Meeting representative of Teversham Parish Council

Teversham Parish Council is always represented at the twice yearly meetings of the Cambridge Airport Consultative Committee.

At the latest meeting held in May it was reported that a review of charter and scheduled flights had been conducted and as a result it was concluded that they were not commercially viable. Now with the exception of the SUNAIR Flight, operating under a British Airways Logo which operates as a charter flight each day from Monday to Thursday, there would no longer be any charter or scheduled flights from Cambridge in the foreseeable future.

The General Manager of the Airport said that the focus in the future is on General Aviation traffic plus aircraft coming in to MARSHALL AEROSPACE AND DEFENCE GROUP for maintenance purposes.

It was also reported that there had been a 5% decrease in movements in 2015 and that 2016 would not see any increase.

As you may have read in the local press it was good to hear that the Ministry of Defence have awarded Marshalls a multi-million pound contract to maintain the Royal Air Force fleet

Of C-130 Hercules Transport Aircraft.

This 6 year deal will help secure 1100 jobs at Marshalls.

## Cambridge Steiner School

Cambridge Steiner School receives the green light to move on up!

This summer the community of parents, teachers and pupils at the Cambridge Steiner School are celebrating an exciting step forward with their plans to extend the school to include secondary education. Instead of waving goodbye to their current Class 5 (Year 6) pupils they will be inviting them back to continue their educational journey following the *internationally recognised* Steiner Waldorf curriculum. David van Marle, who currently teaches the eldest pupils, will stay with the children as their main class teacher. David said: "I have been with these children for five years now, so I'm really happy to get the chance to proceed with them to the next academic level. This year we've been learning about the ancient Egyptians and the ancient Greeks, so having approval from the Department for Education means that we can start moving on to the Romans and the start of the Medieval times next year!" The Curriculum is profoundly ecological, working from an appreciation of the whole to the parts, encouraging children to keep the widest perspective on their studies at every age. The children acquire knowledge in all the areas of conventional education (maths, science, literacy and so forth), but they also gain something extra: a depth of understanding, a pleasure in learning and an enhanced capacity for curiosity, compassion and creativity.

The school, located in Fulbourn, has enjoyed significant growth in the past few years, as more and more families have chosen to place their children into an educational environment which says 'yes' to childhood and child centred learning and 'no' to unnecessary pressures and standardised testing. The Steiner Waldorf pedagogy emphasises the role of imagination in learning, striving to integrate holistically the intellectual, practical, and artistic development of pupils. It is based on the belief that education should be full of wonder and adventure, so that a child starts a journey of development and learning that lasts a lifetime.
